<p>Science</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Identify, name and compare the structure of a variety of common animals including fish, amphibians, reptiles, birds and mammals, identify and name a variety of common animals that are carnivores, herbivores and omnivores • Recognise that living things can be grouped in a variety of ways and explore and use classification keys to help group, identify and name a variety of living things in their local and wider environment • Identify that most living things live in habitats to which they are suited and describe how different habitats provide for the basic needs of different kinds of animals, identify and name a variety of animals in their habitats, including microhabitats. • Describe how animals obtain their food from plants and other animals, using the idea of a simple food chain, and identify and name different sources of food.

<p>History</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Understand where World War 2 fits within a chronological framework. • Understand the key events of World War 2 and reflect on the impact this had on British children. • Identify the similarities and differences between life for children in the 1940s and life for children now. • Understand that historical information is made up from a range of sources. • Understand the significance of the evacuation of children to Bournemouth during World War 2. • Develop their understanding of rationing during World War 2. 		
<p>Design and technology</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Understand where some foods come from and relate this to their understanding of rationing. • Prepare and cook a variety of savoury dishes which were popular during World War 2 using a range of cooking techniques. • Evaluate the dishes cooked.
